

Following the American Dream!

What is a dreamer? Growing up I was taught that to follow the "American Dream" was to work hard, find out what you love to do, figure out how to get paid for it and anything was possible. More recently, the news speaks of "DREAMers" or "DACA" individuals. Without getting too political, "DREAMers" is a name given to "DACA" (Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals) recipients. Basically, these are individuals that entered the United States illegally as minors, and in most cases, very young minors. Some came with family members, while others entered alone. Fast forward, these individuals are now adults, in many cases married with children, that by the way, are Americans because they were born here. That marriage to an American citizen does NOT give the DACA person automatic citizenship, so imagine the fear of being deported after following everything that the U.S. government has asked of you, since the DACA program began. Many ask, "Well why didn't they become citizens if they have been here for years?" Long story short, there is no "legal" path to citizenship in most, if not all cases. There are many "DACA" people here in our own community. Keep in mind, the majority have followed the law as far as paying for their credentials to remain here, attend school, and/or work here.

Why am I writing this article? I had a young mother approach me about eighteen months ago, and she taught me about DACA. She felt her children were old enough for her to start educating herself. And while I did not know much about the DACA program eighteen months ago, I can assure you, she has taught me so much more than KCALC could ever teach her. To protect her privacy, I will call her Lisa.

Lisa came to the United States as a young teen from Mexico. She entered the U.S. with her sister, and she had no real, traditional schooling. She and her sister began their journey in Chicago, at a hair salon, where Lisa helped around the salon. Lisa moved to Dallas for a short while before eventually ending up in Kingsville. Lisa met and married her husband, and at the tender age of eighteen, began building her beautiful family.

Just over a decade later, Lisa walked into my world. She was persistent about getting her GED, even though I felt she needed a better grasp of the English Language before attending our GED prep classes, but she was relentless! She called me everyday, begging for a chance to prove me wrong. Against my better judgement, I placed her in the class, with the stipulation that she would continue attending the English Literacy classes in the mornings. She agreed.

Within fifteen months, Lisa passed all four sections of the GED. In fact, she scored at almost a college-ready level on one of the portions. This is a huge accomplishment. Remember, she had limited traditional learning! Not only did she pass her GED, but she passed her GED in a language that was not her own. She taught me about perseverance. She taught me about dedication. She taught me about going all in on your dreams.

Lisa's husband has a very good job, and he is extremely proud of her for chasing her dreams. She currently volunteers at the school where her daughters are attending. Lisa also volunteers at KCALC, giving back to the program that helped her accomplish her goal. Lisa even went in to visit with the new group of GED participants, telling them her story and encouraging them to chase their dreams.

As friends now, we are working on new goals to further her education. Lisa wants to work as a teacher, helping those who need to learn the English language. She is so appreciative and ready to reach that next set of goals, while volunteering at KCALC helping others realize their dreams. I see her doing great things. She is extremely bright, and I am so grateful that she was so persistent.
